MEETING OF OCTOBER 4, 2022**

2. **President's Report**

President Moore thanked Lt. Greg Bean for his years of service in law enforcement and wished him well in retirement.

3. **Approval of Minutes**

Commissioner Kirschling moved, seconded by Commissioner Mrozek to approve the minutes of the September 6, 2022 meeting.

4. **Confirmation of bills**

Commissioner Ostrowski moved, seconded by Commissioner Taylor, to approve the confirmation of the September 2022 bills.

Ayes, all; nays, none. Motion carried.

5. **Approval of Officer Jadon Solis**

Commissioner Mrozek moved, seconded by Commissioner Taylor to approve hiring Jadon Solis As a probationary police officer upon the successful completion of all hiring protocols and testing.

Ayes, all; nays, none. Motion carried.

6. **Police Chief's Report**

Notes of Interest:

- October 5, 2022: Lt. Greg Bean retired after 25 years of dedicated service to the Police Department and the City of Stevens Point. We will be having a retirement celebration for him at the Police Department at 10:00 a.m.
- September 24, 2022: Jack Stand Car Cruise group donated \$5,000 to the K9 program.
- September 23, 2022: Honor Guard led the SPASH Homecoming parade.
- September 23, 2022: Officer Samuel Hessel successfully completed Step 2 of the Field Training Officer process.
- September 22, 2022: Officer Radsek had a booth at the Community Safety Fair at the Aging and Disability Resource Center to share information on financial and online safety.

- September 22, 2022: Officer Kris Marchel selected to be our primary handler for the Therapy Dog program, implemented in 2023.
- September 21, 2022: Lights of Christmas Fundraiser at Culvers East attended by Stevens Point Police Department, Portage County Sheriff's Office and Plover Police Department.
- September 20, 2022: Coffee with a Cop at Franny's Restaurant.
- September 19, 2022: Lt. Johnson attended committees and council for approval of a full-time Community Service Officer. One full-time CSO approved and deadline for internal applicants is October 6.
- Lt. Johnson participated in a safety fair at the Children's Discovery Center.
- September 13, 2022: Work began on Police Department parking lot. The parking lot work should be completed at the end of September.
- September 13, 2022: SWAT competed in a competition with five other teams and took first place.
- September 8, 2022: First day of Portage County Citizens Academy.
- September 6, 2022: School began and the Department currently has an opening for a crossing guard. Five crossing guards returned from last year.
- Twenty-six unclaimed bicycles donated to the WI/Nicaragua Partners of America.

Calls of Interest:

- September 25, 2022, road rage with firearm: Officers responded to Bukolt Park to investigate between teen groups. Two groups of teens met for a confrontation in the park. A teen from one of the groups brandished a firearm. Officers conducted a high-risk traffic stop on the suspect vehicle, detaining the occupants. Further investigation learned the gun was an airsoft gun. Also located during the investigation were THC and Vapes. Parents of the suspects summoned and citations issued.
- September 24, 2022, domestic disturbance with weapon: Reports of male striking his house with a hammer. Officers contacted the male who officers arrested for violation of no contact for prior domestic and felony domestic incident.
- September 22, 2022, physical fight with weapons: Alley by Graffiti's, officer responded to group of people fighting with a sledgehammer and possibly a gun. Upon arrival, people scattered. A sledgehammer was located; however, a firearm was not.
- September 21, 2022, disturbance: 500 block Second Street. A female caller reported a known male made forced entry to her residence by kicking in the back door. Upon further investigation, the male was located and arrested for disorderly conduct and bail jumping charges.
- September 20, 2022, threats with firearm: 400 block of Washington. Caller/landlord reported a tenant made threats with a gun. Upon further investigation, tenant threatened to shoot his vehicle with a BB gun. No further action.
- September 20, 2022, domestic disturbance: 400 block of West Street North. Male made threats toward female caller's son. Male taken into custody on P & P warrant as he was in violation of rules.
- September 20, 2022, storm damage: Power outages across the city and flooding at underpasses.
- September 19, 2022, domestic disturbance: 300 block of North Point Drive. Male and female subjects known to law enforcement were involved in physical disturbance. The female was determined to be the primary aggressor. Female resisted arrest and attempted to kick and bite officers. Female caused self-harm during transport in squad by banging her head and kicking the squad interior. Domestic related charges.
- September 18, 2022, injury by stabbing: Male subject presented at Aspirus Stevens Point with a stab wound. Upon further investigation, it was determined the incident took place in Wisconsin Rapids.
- September 17, 2022, high-risk stop: Male suspect from domestic incident at 600 block of Portage Street with felony warrants taken into custody with high-risk stop as he had fled from police during prior attempts to place him in custody.

- September 17, 2022, physical disturbance: 400 block of Second Street. One male physically assaulted another male. However, officers were not able to make contact with suspect. Request for charges for battery.
- September 17, 2022, domestic disturbance: Physical disturbance in which the female suspect assaulted the male victim. Base on prior repeated domestic disturbances, felony domestic battery charges to be forwarded to the district attorney.
- September 15, 2022, disturbance: Report of male attempting to start fights inside of Guu's. Male contacted and cited. During the investigation, other subjects contacted, one of which was arrested on a warrant.
- September 13, 2022, firearm found: Stolen shotgun located in back yard of 100 Union Street.
- September 13, 2022, general school threats: Social media threats of school shooting. Matter investigated by patrol, School Resource officer notified. It was determined to be general media posts, shared locally, and however were not specific to Stevens Point.
- September 11, 2022, disturbance: 1400 block of Soo Marie. Verbal argument that resulted in one party using pepper spray on the other. Request for charges for battery and disorderly conduct.
- September 4, 2022, 1900 block of Ellis Street. Male reportedly overdosed on prescription pills and armed himself with a shotgun. Officers negotiated and were able to have the male surrender and taken into protective custody.
- September 2, 2022, suicidal male with firearm. 3200 Water Street. Officers responded for welfare check on male who learned his wife had been cheating on him. Male was contacted without the gun and arrangements made with a friend to stay with him. Police took the gun for safekeeping.
- September 1, 2022, suspicious male with gun: Report of male walking around with a handgun. Male contacted who recently purchased a handgun and thought it came with a carry concealed weapon license. Male did not have a valid CCW. Firearm confiscated.

Monthly Use of Force Reporting (annual total in parenthesis):

Number of Use of Force Incidents: 5 (50)

- September 3, 2022: Stevens Point Police Department officers responded to a disturbance in a residence. The male inside was destroying property and suspected of being strung out on drugs and alcohol. Officers attempted to reason with the suspect without success. Due to the suspect's threats and carrying an unknown object, one officer removed his taser and pointed at the suspect's chest when the suspect exited the room. The item the suspect was carrying was observed and was not a threat, the taser was holstered. The suspect later handcuffed due to verbal defiance toward the officers. No injuries.
- September 5, 2022: Officer located an unsecured, vacant building in Stevens Point and evidence that people may be squatting there. Officers began to clear the building and located several people inside. While clearing the building, officers had their guns drawn and pointed at the suspect they encountered. No injuries.
- September 7, 2022: Officers were looking for a vehicle driven by a suspect in a domestic abuse incident. The suspect had displayed a handgun to the victims and it was reported the suspect took the gun with him when he left the area in the vehicle. One officer located the suspect vehicle and due to the suspect possibly having a handgun, the officers all pointed their handguns at the suspect when they conducted a high-risk traffic stop. The suspect was taken into custody without incident and a handgun was located in a small pack on his person. No injuries.
- September 17, 2022: Officers were attempting to arrest a subject wanted on fresh domestic abuse charges. The suspect also had a felony warrant and known to carry knives. Once officers located the suspect, he fled on foot. The suspect later was able to get into a Plover Taxi and officers stopped the Taxi and conducted a high-risk traffic stop. All officers had their weapons pointed at the suspect, who refused officer's order for much

of the time, but eventually got out of the vehicle. The suspect was taken into custody without incident or injury.

- September 25, 2022: Officers were called to a road rage incident where there was a report of a gun being displayed. One officer located the suspect vehicle as it left the area of the victim's vehicle and conducted a high-risk traffic stop. Due to the threat of the gun, all officers had their guns out, pointed at the suspect vehicle as verbal commands issued to everyone inside. All occupants were taken in to custody without incident. A facsimile glock handgun was located in the center console of the vehicle. No injuries.

School Resource Officers

SPASH

It has been a very busy month for high school resource officer with all of the homecoming activities (Mr. SPASH, parade, football game, and dance) and three home football games to start the year.

Eighty-eight (88) + calls for service
Two (2) criminal arrests
One (1) citation

A couple of highlights:

- C22-09781 – approximately \$2,400 in damage done to the football blocking shed. Found to be a student, cleared with arrest.
- Three fights so far. Two handled at the school level as far as discipline and one cleared with an arrest for battery, as there was a concussion.
- Four drug related investigations, one of which resulted in locating two bags of marijuana edibles. Cleared with an arrest.
- C22-10338 – threats. This was the report of a possible school shooting, which came in on night shift and primarily handled by patrol but had a lot of ripple effects and occupied Officer Marchel and Officer Kramer the night it came in. We also met with all school staff for a refresher on the standard response protocol.

PJ Jacobs

- Eighty-four (84) + calls for service
- School consequences, 17+
- YES (Youth Enrichment Services) referrals 5 (The Boys and Girls Club of Portage County is partnering with Portage County Health and Human Services Department, Stevens Point Area Public School District, Children's Wisconsin and local law enforcement for the purpose of diverting youth from the formal youth justice system. Our goal is to reduce the amount of Youth Justice referrals from law enforcement)
- Citations, 1
- In addition, there was one student disclosed sexual abuse by a parent, forwarded to detectives and Portage County Health and Human Services for follow-up.
- Spoke with entire student body about our Standard Response Protocol (SRP) safety plans, Portage County Crime Stoppers program (had a good tip which led to a drug bust of edibles) and behavior expectations in the school.

Ben Franklin

For the month of September at Ben Franklin Junior High school, things started out slow and picked up after the first week. As far as police outreach program classes, Officer Marchel taught 76 students who are all seventh graders three different sessions. The first session was about how the internet works and cyberbullying. The second session was on sexting and internet safety and the third session covered conflict resolution and anger management. This involved three different class periods every Thursday and involves classroom discussion, PowerPoint presentations, videos and questions by students.

Additionally there were approximately 40+ calls, which included a fire drill, meeting with students about behavior, meetings with counselors and parents about student behavior and various other incidents including classroom police outreach. A breakdown of more notable incidents include:

- Two knives found either on a student or in their locker

- Four physical incidents involving students hitting or shoving other students to the ground
- One student throwing tables and chairs during a breakdown due to a schedule change by teachers.
- One social media threat that was shared from a Ben Franklin student from another area
- Six bullying incidents
- One sexual assault by a parent reported to counselor/Portage County Health and Human Services
- One theft of a cell phone by a student (recovered)

These incidents resulted in multiple school consequences including suspensions, both in school and out of school, two citations for disorderly conduct, two YES referrals (one accepted) and several meetings with parents. A welfare check conducted on a student whose family recently was evicted and believed to be homeless.

Commissioner Kirschling moved, seconded by Commissioner Ostrowski to accept the following donations:

- \$3,600 donation from a private citizen to purchase pink Breast Cancer badges for distribution to city police officers during the month of October.
- \$150.00 donation from Knights of Columbus (therapy dog)
- \$1,000.00 donation to Auxiliary from Stevens Point Brewery
- \$1,000 donation to Auxiliary from Point Bock Run

Commissioner Kirschling moved, seconded by Commissioner Ostrowski to approve the Police Chief's report for September 2022.

7. Discussion, with possible action, Long Term Agreement with the Village of Park Ridge

A short-term agreement was presented to the Village of Park Ridge for fire suppression activities from July 1 through December 31, 2022. At the request of the Village of Park Ridge, Chief Moody created a long-term agreement proposal. The majority of the language in the long-term agreement is the same as the short-term agreement. One thing that was changed in the long-term agreement proposal are the dates of the contract; the proposed dates of the contract would be January 1, 2023 through May 31, 2025. There were a few formatting changes to the proposed draft in addition to adding 2% dues. A blended formula was used and 10% cost of doing business was also added to the proposed contract. City Attorney Beveridge reviewed the contract.

Commissioner Kirschling moved, seconded by Commissioner Taylor to forward the proposed long-term agreement contract to the Village of Park Ridge for consideration.

Re: October 2022 Chief of Police Report

Commissioners:

The Department would like to make you aware of the following updates:

Notes of Interest:

- Promotional process for Lt. and Sgt. led by Assistant Chief Williams.
- Lt. Johnson, along with the UWSP Dean of Students Office, the Stevens Point Inspections Dept. and the Central WI Apartment Association, completed a presentation to approx. 50 UWSP students who are planning to live off campus next year. The presentation was about an hour long. Lt. Johnson spoke about parking concerns, being a good neighbor and different issues students often end up speaking with SPPD about.
- 10-11-22: SRO Quisler requested we implement a new bicycle donation program for under privileged students. Asst. Chief Rottier developed a form and process for this program and one student has already been a recipient.
- 10-11-22 / 10-13-22: Department wide in-service training with dept. pins dispersed recognizing years of service. (5 year increments)
- 10-13-22: Officer Wierzba and Lieutenant Johnson attended a Career Fair at Pacelli High School. The officers were able to speak with many students about a career in law enforcement. They also had SWAT equipment for the students to try on and items to hand out.
- 10-15-22: Assistant Chief Rottier, Assistant Chief Williams and Chief Kussow volunteered at the Habitat house hanging sheetrock.
- 10-20-22: Lieutenant Johnson and Assistant Chief Rottier interviewed two applicants, both current part-time CSO's with the Department, for the upcoming full-time CSO position, scheduled to start on Nov. 7. The new position was offered to Andrew J. Hensel, who accepted. Andrew has been a part-time CSO with the Department since September of 2020. Twenty-eight (28) people applied for the position.
- 10-25-22: Birth announcement of our new Therapy K9 from Blueberry Cottages. Lucky and Joey had six gorgeous pups (3 females & 3 males). They are a stunning mix of red, caramel, and apricot! We cannot wait to see this litter grow! They will be approximately 30-35 pounds fully grown!

- 10-27-22: Members of the Department met with Administrators of the Stevens Point Area School District to discuss/debrief the swatting call.
- 10-28-22: Promotion of Sergeant Long to Lieutenant and Lead Officer Roser to Sergeant.
- 10-29-22: Portage County Drug Take Back at the Lincoln Center.

Calls of Interest:

- **10-25-22: Assault,** Point After, Officers responded to report that a homeless person demanded food from the cook. After the cook refused, the homeless male physically beat the cook and took off. Male was located in the Library tunnel where he was arrested. During the arrest, the male attempted to burn officers with a lighter.
- **10-24-22: Threats,** Patrol assist PJ Jacobs School Resource Officer with threats to shoot up a student's house via snap chat.
- **10-24-22: Report of missing firearm**
- **10-23-22: Missing Family** from Michigan located in Stevens Point, The family reported missing from Michigan (in national media). Michigan Law Enforcement notified that all was good.
- **10-22-22: Disturbance with Weapons,** two males reported located in front of 300 block of Washington wearing ski masks waiving firearms. Upon further investigation, the firearms were determined to be air soft.
- **10-20-22: OD on Fentanyl,** 2300 block of Heffron Street. Male subject found unresponsive and given narcan by officer. Upon medical clearance subject taken to jail on felony bail jump and possession.
- **10-20-22: Fake 911 Call of Active Shooter** at SPASH. Prior to call officers received information of similar fake swatting calls around the state. Officers from SPPD, PTSO, and Plover responded for a lock down and cleared the building.
- **10-19-22 Drug Interdiction Stop w/firearm:** SPPD Officers conducted traffic stop with K-9 indication that resulted in confiscation of a firearm, drugs and cash seized from a Felon who was arrested for Possession of Drugs and Firearm.
- **10-16-22 Disturbance with Firearm:** SPPD officer responded to a disturbance near Whiting and Henrietta between a male and female who broke up. The female had two of her male friends confront her ex and the ex's friend about stolen property. During the confrontation between the groups of males, a firearm was produced and used to threaten the complainant. Suspects were gone prior to police arrival but not before they slashed the complainant's vehicle tire.
- **10-16-22 day time domestic:** Two females were involved in a physical domestic at 700 block of Smith Street. The primary aggressor had taken pills prior to police arrival and was transported for medical clearance with request for charges.
- **10-15-22: Fight,** Report of two males fighting near Rogers and Center Point, Both males contacted by Officers and cited.

- **10-15-22: Damage to Squad by drunk driver.** Female driver backed into SPPD squad, causing damage. Female driver believed to be under the influence. PTSO requested to investigate and later arrested female for operating while under the influence.
- **10-14-22 Drug interdiction:** SPPD Investigation Bureau and Patrol worked drug interdiction, resulting in multiple arrests and confiscation of drugs, cash and a firearm.
- **10-14-22: Report of Threats with Firearm.** Male reported another male flashed a firearm at him. Further investigation found no gun actually was displayed.
- **10-11-22: Violation of Domestic Restraining order.** Male suspect was located sleeping inside the complainant's garage and later arrested.
- **10-11-22: Disturbance with weapons.** 1600 block of Clark, Street, 15-year-old male armed himself with two large kitchen knives and barricaded himself in a room. Male was upset because parents found THC in his room. Officers were able to negotiate with the 15-year-old to disarm himself. 15-year-old has brain tumor and does not like being told what to do. Family to follow up with Portage County Health and Human Services.
- **10-08-22: Disturbance with Pepper Spray,** 3500 block Bush, Neighbors involved in disturbance during which one of the pepper sprayed the other. Parties separated neither one wanted police action.
- **10-08-22: Fight,** report of fight at Kim's barrel INN, Investigation pending
- **10-08-22: Disturbance,** 100 block Minnesota Avenue. Niece and Aunt involved in fight over aunt having relations with her boyfriend. Domestic criteria not met, parties separated.
- **10-07-22: Disturbance** at PJ Jacobs, two male teens were engaged in physical pushing and verbal arguing during a volleyball game. A parent became physically involved placing hands on one of the teens. Parties separated and citation issued to adult.
- **10-06-22: OWI Hit and run Property damage,** Officers located and stopped female driver who was under the influence. During arrest female had reached for scissors located inside her purse. Female had caution data for concealing a knife in bra, she attempted to access the knife during arrest. Driver arrested for Operating while under the influence.
- **10-05-22: Welfare check/resisting arrest,** Officers checked welfare of female possibly under the influence of meth making suicidal comments. Subject had an active warrant and placed under arrest. Subject physically resisted arrest. Subject later taken to jail.

Monthly Use of Force Reporting (annual total in parenthesis):

Number of Use of Force Incidents: 9 (59)

10/3/22 – Officers were dispatched to a local motel where there was a male subject knocking on doors, waking up residents and even punching one resident. Officers made contact with the subject and after an investigation advised the subject he was under arrest. The subject refused to go to jail and physically resisted officers as they tried to handcuff him. He was able to pull away from one of the officers. One Officer removed his Taser from his holster and advised the subject he would be tased if he did not comply. Officers were then able to decentralize the subject to the ground and handcuff him. No injuries.

10/5/22 – Officers were dispatched to a residence for a welfare check, where the information provided was that the person wished to harm themselves. Upon arrival, Officers were advised the subject had left on foot and likely had drugs on her. Officers located the subject and she refused to cooperate with the Officers. Once the Officers advised the subject they were under arrest for a Probation Hold, the subject refused to remove their hand from their purse. Officers placed the subject into handcuffs. There were narcotics located in the purse. No injuries.

10/5/22 – Members of the Detective Bureau conducted a drug search warrant on a residence. During the execution, members pointed their guns at the suspects inside until everyone was in custody. No injuries.

10/6/22 – Members of the Stevens Point SWAT Team assisted Wood County Sheriff's Office with a multiple target drug warrant. During the assist, members of the SWAT team pointed their firearms at suspects inside until they were taken into custody. No injuries

10/6/22 – Officers were called to a hit and run crash. Officers located the run vehicle and conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle. The driver was suspected of being under the influence of drugs and had caution data that they kept a knife in their bra. The suspect became verbally uncooperative with Officers while still in her vehicle and reached down into her bra. One Officer was able to grab both of her hands, while another Officer opened the door to the vehicle. Those two Officers removed the subject and decentralized the suspect and handcuffed her. A butterfly knife was located in the subject's bra. The subject was later taken for a blood draw and tried to fight with Officers while in the ER and had to be held down. The subject later spit on an officer while being loaded into the squad. No injuries.

10/11/22 – A SPPD Detective assisted with a drug search warrant in Marquette County. During the execution of the warrant, the Detective pointed their firearm at the suspects on scene until everyone was in custody. No injuries.

10/13/22 – SPPD Detectives and Officers executed a search warrant on a residence. During the warrant, Officers pointed their firearms at the suspect inside until they were safely in custody. No injuries.

10/20/22 – SPPD Officers responded to SPASH for a report of an active shooter. Once Officers were inside the school they attempted to sweep the school, looking for any injured or a threat. While doing this the Officers had their handguns or rifles out at the low ready. They encountered many students and staff members. No threat was found and the call was believed to be a swatting call, no injuries.

10/22/22 – A SPPD Officer, along with SPFD Paramedics were on a call where there was an intoxicated female, who was acting strange and uncontrollable. The subject was escorted to an ambulance where she proceeded to kick a Paramedic in the groin. The SPPD Officer then held the suspect down and applied a wrist hold, until the suspect agreed to calm down. The suspect then began to spit at the Paramedics and the Officer and tried to bite another Paramedic. At

that time the Officer held the subject down, secured their head and applied the Mandibular angle (top corner of jaw, behind the ear) pressure point effectively, gaining compliance from the suspect. The suspect was medically cleared due to their level of intoxication and then jailed. No injuries.

10-08-22: on 10/18/2022, K9 Barry and I assisted Officer Lepinski on a traffic stop. K9 Barry was deployed and came to a final response. A search of the vehicle was conducted and a large amount of cash was located in the driver's pocket. There was marijuana located in a backpack and a hidden compartment located in the trunk of the vehicle.

10-08-22: Plover requested additional units for a disturbance at Walmart. I assisted PPD Officer Noll who requested K9 Fala conduct a sniff of the vehicle he was out with after the disturbance. The female in the vehicle had a warrant and Officer Noll was waiting on confirmation as well as a responsible party to pick up the children from Walmart. While Fala was being walked up to the suspect car she had sniffed the driver's side of another parked vehicle as well as the front ends of two other vehicles in the lot and showed no COB. While moving towards the suspect vehicle Fala's whole body snapped to the vehicle, she sniffed the bottom of the front bumper and sat providing a positive indication. She was praised and returned to my squad car. The driver advised that the male she was with was an avid marijuana user. Officer Bahling told me when he turned the male over to Wood County they knew him to be an avid marijuana and heroin user. Officer Noll said the located tin bindles on the male when he was arrested. A search of the vehicle resulted in an unknown white powder being located in the center console. It appeared the white powder had come out of a hand filled plastic pill capsule and spilled in the console. Officer Noll later advised that he tested the unknown powder for multiple drugs but all tests were negative.

10-09-22: Portage County Sheriff's Office was looking for this vehicle for a welfare check. I located the vehicle and contact the driver John Nelson and Passenger Stephanie Bennett. They had argued, but worked it out. I deployed K9 Barry and he came to a final response. In the vehicle, there were several, over a dozen uncapped used needles under the seat and between the seats. I also located several used cooker tins. Due to safety reasons, the search was stopped.
